From Our Archives: A Strange Incident on E. Mifflin St.

At approximately 3:30 a.m. on December 25, 2022, the Orwigsburg Police Department was dispatched to a residence on E. Mifflin St., responding to a break-in and entering report. Assisting in the response were units from Schuylkill Haven Borough, Penn State Schuylkill, and the Pennsylvania State Police.

Further information provided via dispatch said the homeowner was in bed and could hear a clatter on the lawn. The Orwigsburg patrolman, arriving on scene, witnessed a sleigh and eight reindeer with a little old driver, so lively and quick. The suspect was identified as "good old Saint Nick."

Up to the house was the course that they flew, with the sleigh full of toys and St. Nick, too! Assisting units were ordered to turn around as down the chimney came St. Nick with a bound!

The homeowner claimed St. Nick committed burglary and wanted him arrested. Santa was promptly taken into custody by the demand of the homeowner, as he was to receive coal that Christmas morning.

Under PA law, the crime of burglary requires that a person enter a building with the intent to commit a crime. In this case, however, Santa Claus had no intent to commit a crime ... while in the house, he was simply doing his job to deliver presents. "Burglary" did not fit the circumstances.

However, this incident did present an interesting





legal question. The potential crime Santa Claus may have committed was found under PA Title 18, section 3503(a)(1)(i) – Criminal Trespass, stating "A person commits an offense if, knowing that he is not licensed or privileged to do so, he: enters, gains entry by subterfuge or surreptitiously remains in any building or occupied structure or separately secured or occupied portion thereof."

The Orwigsburg officer called the Schuylkill County District Attorney's Office for guidance as to whether or not Santa committed the crime of Criminal Trespass. The legal question raised during the incident is "Did Santa believe he was licensed or privileged to enter the residence?"

Ultimately, it was decided Santa was invited into the residence by the very homeowner who wanted him arrested and was to get coal that morning. Due to the home having a Christmas tree, milk and cookies set out, and stockings hung by the chimney with care – it was determined the family hoped St. Nick would soon be there!

Santa was quickly released from custody by the Orwigsburg officer and allowed to continue on his way. The family did have presents under the tree; but, the person who called 911 received coal that Christmas morning.


In reviewing this incident and its legal ramifications, the Orwigsburg Police Department, along with the Schuylkill County District Attorney's Office, found that Santa Claus can't be arrested for any crime at all!

Since Santa is the leader of the North Pole and that the United States has established diplomatic relations with the North Pole, Santa Claus is considered a foreign dignitary and is subject to Title 22 of the United States Code Section 254 – otherwise known as the Diplomatic Relations Act of 1978.

Under this Act, the United States grants Santa Claus and all foreign dignitaries Diplomatic Immunity. Therefore, even if grandma gets run over by a reindeer, Santa can't be held criminally responsible.

A Mifflin Street neighbor, awakened by all the commotion that early morn, reported that Santa was heard to exclaim, ere he drove out of sight, "Happy Christmas to all, and to all a good-night!"

Limited First Edition Redware Bowl w/ Fraktur Design

The Orwigsburg Historical Society (OHS) & Museum is celebrating its 30th year anniversary by commissioning a limited, first edition Redware Pottery handmade by Zettlemoyer Pottery, located in Ham-

burg. The unique bowl design is fashioned from the work of Orwigsburg's highly acclaimed fraktur artist, Johann Conrad Gilbert (1734-1812).

Gilbert lived in Orwigsburg and was a Lutheran schoolmaster who served in both Schuylkill and Berks counties. He is buried in the historic Zion's Red Church Cemetery.

It was during his tenure as a schoolmaster that Gilbert created the earliest Easter Bunny fraktur drawings. One such drawing is now in the collection at Winterthur Museum in Delaware; a second is in Williamsburg, VA. A very

prolific fraktur artist, Gilbert created many birth and marriage certificates.

Nearly 65,000 immigrants from Germany settled in Pennsylvania during the period of 1727 to 1775, bringing the art of both fraktur and redware to America. The Pennsylvania Germans elevated this unique pottery from utilitarian household use to true works of art.

Today, Tammy Zettlemoyer, a 9th generation Pennsylvania German, carries on the tradition of making redware pottery. Her family immigrated to Amer-

ica in 1732 and she is honored to be able to keep redware alive for another generation. Zettlemoyer Pottery is leadfree, oven and food safe.

The Orwigsburg Historical Society 30th Anniversary limited-edition Redware Bowl with Fraktur Design taken from Johann Conrad Gilbert Fraktur Art measures 6-1/2 inches in diameter. All bowls will be hand-embossed on the reverse side with anniversary information, dates, the name of Johann Conrad Gilbert and also Zettlemoyer Pottery, and the number of the bowl.

Orwigsburg Fire Department . . . by Chief Scott Rarick

Think Fire Prevention During This Holiday Season

So, this is now the sixth article I've written for *Orwigsburg Happenings* since becoming Fire Chief ... two informational topics for this issue.

Protect your home and family

Front and center, at all times, take steps to prevent a fire from occurring. Colder temperatures are already here; so, let's focus on your sources of heat.

Ensure that your heating equipment is properly cleaned and inspected on an annual basis.

Your heating source is the second leading cause of home fires and the third leading cause of home fire fatalities. According to recent statistics from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), an average of 46,000 home heating related fires occur each year. Those fires result in 480 deaths, 1350 injuries,

and over a billion dollars in property damage.

The NFPA offers these tips as we enter the heating season:

- Heating equipment and chimneys should be cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional.
- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, including furnaces, fireplaces, wood stoves, and space heaters.

• Fireplaces should have a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room.

- Ashes should be cool before placing them into a metal container and then taking it outside the home and storing/depositing the ashes at least 10 feet away from the structure.
- All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.
- Make sure that you have smoke and carbon monoxide alarms throughout your home and test them monthly to ensure that they are working properly.

Additionally at this time of year, space heaters are most often responsible for home heating equipment fires and account for more than two-in-five fires and are the leading contributor in fire deaths.

- Make sure space heaters are in good working order and used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- When purchasing, choose a space heater with a seal of a qualified testing laboratory.
- Turn off and unplug portable heaters when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Ensure that your space heater has tip-over protection.
- Choose a heater with a thermostat and overheat protection.
- Plug them directly into an outlet; never use an extension cord.

"Buggy" designed to be first on scene

Secondly, I want to introduce you to the newest addition to our fleet of equipment. You may have noticed an SUV-type of vehicle and thought that it was the police.



Well, you're not necessarily wrong. Last year, the fire department took possession of a retired Orwigsburg Police Department vehicle - a

2016 Ford Explorer. This vehicle has been repurposed and continues to serve the residents of Orwigsburg and surrounding communities as a Duty Officer vehicle known as "The Buggy."

You may ask yourself, what is a Duty Officer vehicle? Well, the primary purpose is to function as a first-arriving unit with Incident Command capabilities. The intent is to arrive at the scene of an incident, perform an initial size-up, and establish Incident Command. The person that will typically operate the vehicle will be one of our officers within the fire department.

There is a variety of equipment stowed in the unit – an Incident Command board, dry chemical and

pressurized water extinguishers, automated external defibrillator (AED), self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA), collapsible ladder, toolbox, and other resource equipment. Our future plans will add additional equipment, such as a four-gas meter, thermal imaging camera (TIC), and a computer.

Thank you for reading this article and the support you give to our department and the work that we do. I wish all a safe and enjoyable holiday season.

While I can't change inflation, I can bring awareness of state resources that are available to help Schuylkill County seniors. I welcomed many to my Senior Expo held in Orwigsburg this past September.

Representatives from Pennie, Pennsylvania's official health coverage marketplace, offered ways to save money on health care costs. The Salvation Army shared info on its rent, mortgage and utility assis-

tance programs. The county Assistance Office offered its many services, including the home heating assistance program known as LIHEAP. The state Treasury spoke of unclaimed property and the hundreds of millions of dollars that 10% of Pennsylvanians have waiting for them in the vault in Harrisburg.

It isn't only financial help that the state offers. The Schuylkill Transportation System showed seniors its shared ride program, bus routes and other helpful ways to get around. Thomas Pharmacy was there to give flu shots. The county Veterans Administration Clinic was on hand to talk about the many services offered to veterans. The Retired and Senior Volunteer Program of Schuylkill County shared how attendees could get more involved in their community.


