Government Reorganization Begins the New Year

Major Snowstorm Is Behind Us; Spring Is Near!

Orwigsburg residents and businesses weathered the January 22-23 major snowstorm – the first of this winter – that dumped more than 24 inches of the white stuff. Rapid and effective response by the streets department, the timing of the snowfall during the weekend, and the wonderful cooperation from motorists and property owners minimized the inconvenience.

In the 2015 November General Election, Orwigsburg residents voted to retain two current Orwigsburg Borough Council members while placing one new representative on the seven-member council.

Incumbents Susan Murphy and Paul Bedway, Jr. will each serve another four-year term and will be joined by newly elected member Brian Baldwin, who

council president; Murphy was reelected vice president; and councilman Ed Mady was reelected Pro Tem, meaning he will head the council in the absence of the other two.

Attorney Paul Datte, principal in the law firm of Cerullo, Datte, and Burke, has been named solicitor for the council, replacing Frank Tamulonis, Esq. who has served the borough in that capacity for several decades.

President Touchinsky announced several former committees would be consolidated into two renamed groups – the Water, Sewer & Sanitation Committee and the Buildings, Streets & Lights Committee – to make room for two new forward-looking committees of Borough Council.

New committees formed

The Communication & Technology Committee will consider and direct a revamp/upgrade to the borough's website, *www.orwigsburg.net*, as well as provide guidance and control over its Facebook and Twitter accounts. It is being tasked to provide effective, responsible, and consistent communication for residents, businesses, and interested parties.

The Economic Development Committee will focus on developing improved marketing of business opportunities in Orwigsburg, address vacancies and the needs of the downtown, and seek further development in the borough's industrial park.

Message from the Council President

"What's up with the Memorial?"

Over the past few months, and maybe even the past year or two, I have had people ask me this question about the Orwigsburg Veterans Community

Memorial Hall, or by the shortened name "The Memorial." Being that the project is nearing completion, but still needing financial help, I thought I'd answer that very question.

Originally erected back in the 1940s, the building honoring Orwigsburg area war veterans was dedicated in 1950 and turned over to the Borough. The Memorial has been used by many thousands of people over the years ... for

activities and events by youth and community groups, emergency service training, sports teams, semi-pro basketball, professional wrestling, class reunions, service club and business association events, the annual Memorial Day Lions' chicken barbecue, and the circus.

Once the interior was completed even though renovations continued, the building has been booked solid after-school and on the weekends. Along with the surrounding ball fields, playground, and walking trails, it's truly a place the entire community can enjoy.

In addition to being a community gathering spot, we need to remember the other purpose of the building ... to




honor our veterans. This is why, when about ten years ago it was evident something had to be done with the building, community leaders and volunteers decided to form the Orwigsburg Veterans' Memorial Task Force. The Task Force took on the job to repair and update the building. Its status as a tribute and reminder of the sacrifices by those veterans will live on with the building continuing as a community center of activities.

The Task Force members and committed community members have volunteered countless hours since the project started. Not only do they meet to plan and coordinate work being done, but often they roll up their sleeves and do much of the work themselves.

Demolition of the old bathrooms, pouring the concrete and setting stairs for basement access,





State property tax, rent rebates

Forms to apply for Pennsylvania's Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program for 2015 are now available at the kiosk inside at the Orwigsburg Municipal Office, 209 N. Warren Street between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Forms are also available by calling Rep. Jerry Knowles' Tamaqua office at 570-668-1240.

Eligible residents or property owners can receive a rebate of up to \$650 based on their rent or property taxes paid in 2015. The program benefits Pennsylvanians who are 65 years or older, widows and widowers 50 years or older, and those 18 years or older with disabilities.

Income limits for homeowners are set at the following levels, excluding 50 percent of Social Security, Supplemental Security Income, and Railroad Retirement Tier 1 benefits:

- \$0 to \$8,000, maximum \$650 rebate (homeowners or renters)
- \$8,001 to \$15,000, maximum \$500 rebate (homeowners or renters)

 - \$15,001 to \$18,000, maximum \$300 rebate (homeowners only)
 - \$18,001 to \$35,000, maximum \$250 rebate (homeowners only)

This rebate program is one of many initiatives supported by the Pennsylvania Lottery. Residents are reminded to provide all the necessary income, property tax or rental information required to process claims quickly and accurately. Applications are due by June 30.

Dumpster? You need a permit

Any resident who rents a dumpster and places it on the street is required to

fill out a dumpster permit a prior to dumpster delivery. Permits are available at the borough office at a cost of \$5. The permit is good for



three weeks; another permit is required for additional time. Four (4) reflectors are required on each side of the dumpster, and dumpster wheels must be placed on 3/4" thick pieces of wood so as not to damage the road surface.

able from the borough office. Forty-eight hours notice must be given to allow time to get the cones delivered to their location and signs made and placed on the cones.

Take care of your property

Property owners must keep all premises and exterior property free from weeds or plant growth in excess of 6 inches. All noxious weeds are prohibited.

Weeds are defined as all grasses, annual plants and vegetation, other than trees or shrubs provided; however, this term does not include cultivated flowers and gardens.

The property owner must also maintain weeds appearing between sidewalk blocks and between the curb and the street.

Owner/tenant forms

Reminder to all landlords: Orwigsburg Borough Ordinance #396 requires that every owner/lessor of any apartment, house or other type of rental building shall register with the Borough every year. If any tenant moves from the dwelling during the year, the owner shall notify the Borough within thirty (30) days of said changes. Forms are available at the borough office or from the borough website.

In addition, landlords living in excess of 20 miles from the Borough must designate a local manager for the property. This individual must live within 10 miles of the borough.

Albright's Woods

reunion or other event. Albright's Woods is located on Grove Street in Orwigsburg. The park has a pavilion with picnic tables and a kitchen available for use. Rental fee for the kitchen is \$75, \$25 of which is a returnable security deposit. If the kitchen is not needed, a \$25 fee is charged. For further details or to make a reservation to use the park, call the borough office at 570-366-3103.

Used flags may be brought to the borough office for proper disposal. Place flags inside the designated mailbox-like container in front of the borough building.



Help us help you

It shall be the responsibility of property owners in the Orwigsburg Borough to number their buildings. The number needs to be placed over/under each front door, or front transom bar or glass or front show window, over or on either side of the entrance or upon a permanent standard, base or support between build-



ing and street. The number is to be of paint, metal, enamel, plastic, or other weather resistant material and at least three inches in height, the color of the numbers to be in contrast to the immediate back-

ground, and shall be so placed as to be in full view and legible from the street. No numbers shall be covered with any sign, drapery, or other obstruction and all old numbers shall be removed when a new number is assigned.

Utility bills

As this newsletter is being published, the due date

for quarterly utility bills is fast approaching. It is the responsibility of all property owners to pay their bills in full by the due date printed on the invoice.

The Borough relies on these payments in order to meet the debt service and operating costs for the water, wastewater and sanitation services. If a bill is not paid after a short grace period, collection efforts will be initiated. If efforts to collect payments are unsuccessful, additional steps could include interruption of service and/or a lien placed on your property. Property owners are responsible for all costs incurred to collect past due obligations.

To avoid these actions and additional costs, property owners must make payment arrangements with the Borough. Have accounts up to date or a payment arrangement in place by then to avoid loss of service. Mail your payment to 209 N. Warren St., Orwigsburg,

or drop it off during regular hours at the Municipal Building. A "drop box" has been located

at the front door for your convenience if paying after hours. Please do not include cash when dropping off your payment.

Call before you dig!

Contractors, service companies, or do-it-yourself property owners must call 8-1-1 before disturbing the ground in and around their property. Planting a tree? Building a Know what's below.

deck? Installing a fence or **Call** before you dig. even as simple as a mailbox,

plan your project in advance and call the alert number several days before starting any digging project.

Tell the operator where you're planning to dig. Your affected local utility companies will be notified about your intent to dig and will send locators to your dig site to mark the approximate location of buried lines with flags or paint.

Curb your animal

Borough Ordinance 299 prohibits pet owners from allowing their pets to defecate on another property without removing the feces from that property. Those violating this ordinance can be fined up to \$600.

Many residents take advantage of the parks and walking trail and are discouraged by the lack of consideration shown by some pet owners.

The website also includes a link allowing residents to enter their contact information into the borough's Swiftreach 911 emergency notification system. This site allows the Borough to notify residents via telephone, text message and email of boil water advisories, weather emergencies or any other emergencies in a prompt manner.

Snow emergencies

We may be trying hard to forget the experience of a snowy winter, but it is that time of year again. Here are a few reminders when the snow flies.

A "Snow Emergency" may be called by the mayor. Parking will be restricted on streets designated as

"Snow Emergency Routes." Parking will NOT be permitted on the even side of a snow emergency route on even dates and the odd side of the street on odd dates. Note there will be no parking allowed on either side of the Square during a snow emergency.

Notice will be posted on the borough website, borough Facebook page and provided to the Republican Herald newspaper and radio stations WPPA-AM and WAVT-FM.

Households with a current telephone number in our database will receive a pre-recorded message call with information concerning the snow emergency. You may also receive notifications via email and text

message. If you have not already done so, add your contact information via the Swiftreach link on the home page of the borough website:

www.orwigsburg.net.

Vehicles parked on a designated Snow Emergency Route in violation will be ticketed and could be towed. The vehicle owner is responsible for all towing costs.

Large item disposal

One large item may be placed at the curb beside your regular trash once per month.

Regular trash consists of up to six bags of garbage and up to ten bags of leaves. Residents should place trash at the curb any time after 6 p.m. on evenings prior to collection. Because pickup times vary,



Large item collection, once per month

Convenient, single-stream curbside recycling is available to residents every two weeks on the designated trash pickup day. Recyclables should be separated from other household trash and placed in the container provided by the Borough and County Waste, or in a container of the property owner's choice clearly designated for recycling.

Single-stream recycling means items can be co-mingled in one container/recycle bin without the need for separation.

Materials for recycling are collected curbside every two weeks on your designated trash pickup day (see calendar schedule above). Simply place your



Use the following guidelines to prepare recyclables for pickup:

- Newspapers and mixed paper should be bundled or placed in a paper or clear plastic bag in order to keep them secure.
- Cardboard should be flattened and bundled.
- Take steps to ensure paper, cardboard and plastic, etc. do not blow around to neighboring properties or streets.
- Glass food and beverage containers are recyclable and include items such as glass soda, beer, wine, liquor, ketchup or juice bottles, and glass food containers. Metal caps and lids should be removed, but labels can remain.

Single-Stream Recycling

- Glass items such as mirrors, ceramic cups and plates, crystal, clay flower pots, light bulbs, window glass, drinking glass and heat-resistant ovenware are NOT recycled by glass container plants and should not be mixed in with container glass.
- Aluminum beverage cans should be rinsed and crushed. Steel cans need only be rinsed. Leave labels in place.
- Plastic soda bottles and milk jugs should also be rinsed and crushed.
- Be considerate of the streetscape view in your neighborhood; store your recycling container to the side or back of your property or residence.

After following these instructions, combine all materials in one recycling container and place curbside after 6 p.m. the evening before pickup. Recyclables must be in their special container separate from household trash because a separate collection is made.

Given the convenience of single-stream recycling, the number of occupants in your household, and the volume collected for recycling, residents may find the need for a smaller or larger container. The borough has two sizes available.



Renovations continue; funds yet needed

The Veterans Memorial Development Task Force is working with the Borough to execute an existing DCNR C2P2 grant to improve the recreation area on the grounds of Memorial Hall. A new play structure and swing set have arrived and installation with corresponding site improvements will

be done soon.

A \$225,000 grant received last year through the Keystone Communities Program will fund stormwater management and parking lot improvements. Before those improvements can be started, a concrete patio and corresponding sidewalks need to be installed to facilitate access to the new addi-

tion. The task force must raise the funds for those improvements before the parking lot and drainage work can proceed.

The interior of the new entryway that will honor area veterans and the commercial kitchen upgrade are two major stand-alone interior projects to be tackled over the next year, assuming the funds can be raised. The entry will also be home to the original Orwigsburg Court House clock, restored by Schuylkill Lodge #138 F&AM.

With the recent progress and building status, this facility can be used for many different functions, such as meetings, public activities, recreation events, parties, private affairs, etc. Work will continue, but





carbon monoxide detector calls, medical assists for heart attacks from shoveling, etc. Despite this massive storm, the OFD did not receive a single call. Common sense appears to have ruled the day. By and large, everyone stayed safe at home. While we were ready to answer the call if anyone needed help, we were happy to stay idle during the storm.

Fireplaces and Woodstoves

 Have your fireplace or woodstove and chimney inspected each year to ensure no cracks exist in the flue liner and the chimney is free of creosote buildup.



- Use only dry, seasoned hardwoods in the fireplace or woodstove. Do not burn trash such as wrapping paper.
- Never use flammable liquids such as gasoline or kerosene to start the fire.



Space Heaters

- Operate kerosene heaters only in well-ventilated areas to prevent carbon monoxide buildup.
- Do not attempt to use any fuel other than kerosene in the heater. Use of other flammable liquids can lead to an explosion and fire.
- Allow the heater to cool and take it outside before attempting to refill it.
- If you are using an electric space heater, make sure it has a safety certification label from an independent testing organization, such as the UL mark from Underwriters Laboratories.
- Check the power cord for cracks, fraying, loose connections and broken plugs. Have the cord repaired or replace the heater if you find any damage.
- Plug electric space heaters directly into the wall outlet and avoid using extension cords.

Heating Safety

The devices we use to heat our homes, such as fireplaces, woodstoves, and space heaters are the single largest source of residential fires each year. More than half of these fires occur during the cold weather months of December, January and February. A few simple tips and precautions can prevent most of these heating fires.

General Precautions

- Keep children, pets, and flammable items at least three feet from any heat source.
- Never leave space heaters, woodstoves, or fireplaces unattended.
- Make sure you have at least one properly functioning smoke detector on each level of your home and a carbon monoxide detector in the room where any heating device that burns wood, coal or kerosene is located.

As you are digging out from that snowstorm, take a few minutes to dig out the neighborhood fire hydrant. This will save valuable time in the event of a fire. Also, check on your elderly neighbors to see if they need any extra help.

Zion's Red Church



Landscape Design - A Problem Solving Journey

Local landscape architect and owner of Season's Art Landscape Design, Tim Hill, offers the following design thoughts for homeowners.

"They were on sale at the end of the season," is often a reason given when working with the homeowner on a new landscape design. A row of fast-grow-

ing shrubs reduced the walkway to a narrow path. A tree blocked a view, grew into overhead wires, and its branches scraped the side of the house.

I've been installing landscapes for more than 40 years. Important lessons learned are you have to roll up your sleeves, get your hands in the soil, and you've got to keep on learning. The amount of informa-

tion and possibilities are endless. When I first started in business, there were 50,000 varieties of daylilies ... now there are more than 90,000!

The landscape design process can be lengthy, but I'll try to give homeowners some direction as each looks at their own property.

Enjoy the experience

- Accept that you have to put some time into the process. A glass of wine along the way helps.
- Analyze and get to know your property ... very important! Consider sun path, wind direction, existing soils and depth, existing vegetation, underground utilities, views, climate zone, ground slope, drainage, architecture style and colors, surrounding landscapes, and noise.
- Define your lifestyle, goals, and budget. Ask yourself: How long will I be living here and how much time will I spend outdoors? How much sun or shade

and in what areas? Is space needed for pets or outdoor sports with the children? An herb or vegetable garden? How much time do I want to spend on yard maintenance?

 Learn about the possibilities. Pour another glass of wine. Check out books and magazines; watch

home/garden shows; and walk around area garden centers. Take a drive exploring other landscapes. Make a list of plants and materials you like and then learn about each plant's requirements and ultimate size.

 Begin thinking, dreaming, designing. It's important to explore alternatives; don't be locked into your first idea. Start with functional ele-

ments such as driveways, walkways, and patios. Trees and larger shrubs should be located first and then work your way down to perennials and ground covers. Consider color, scale, texture, form and bloom times to assure interesting year-long seasonal displays.

You don't have to be an artist. Many great ideas begin as a sketch on a restaurant napkin. Designs can be two-dimensional in plan view, but don't forget height as an important part of the end result. Measure all existing structures and elements so you can place them in proper scale.

Take your plan to the outdoors with a tape measure, small flags and white spray paint. Measure and mark your walks, patio, and planting beds. Use the flags to mark trees and shrubs. Spend time walking through your vision and imagine the beauty.

Your dream landscape takes a large investment of time before you spend a dime. But it's worth it!
